Items that can be recycled in Feilding								
•	Batteries	Bunnings sometimes has a bin inside their front door for batteries. When they are not taking them, you can take them free of charge to the Transfer Station.						
•	Coffee pods/capsules	Dry them, bag them and take them to Harrison's Garden World, 8 Reid Line West. There a box for them behind the check out.						
•	Coins – old NZ and foreign	Resene Color Shop (across from the Warehouse) collects coins for Lions NZ to raise motor Kiwi Kids.						
•	Eyeglasses	If they are in good condition, Visique on Manchester Square takes them. Specsavers, in the Plaza, Palmerston North also takes them.						
•	Garden pots – clean	Mitre 10, Feilding takes clean, number 5 pots only. Harrison's Garden World also has a bin where you can drop off and pick up clean pots.						
•	Light bulbs - used	Drop in bin at Mitre 10, Feilding. Bulbs should not go into the rubbish collection as they are hazardous.						
•	MIsc. craft materials	Pre-schools and schools use these for projects. Keep a bag handy to collect bits and pieces and when full, call your local school to check if they want them and where to drop them off. This includes scrap paper, bottle tops, small boxes, fabric, knitting wool, wood offcuts, cards, paint samples, ice cream containers, wallpaper, etc. Use your imagination.						
•	Cellphones, laptops, computers	Accepted at the Tech Store, 82 Fergusson Street, Feilding and Feilding Scrap Metal, 1a Mihinui Street.						
•	Old towels and sheets	Check with the local SPCA shop on Fergusson Street. They can pass them on to the animal shelter in Palmerston North.						
•	Paint tins	Resene will recycle all paint tins up to 10 litres if the paint is still wet, the can is not too rusty, and the lids can be easily removed. Resene cans/pails are free to recycle but there may be a small charge for other brands. If you have more than a few cans, call first to ensure they have room. Feilding Scrap Metal also takes empty tins.						
•	Printer ink cartridges and toners	Computer Shop on Kimbolton Road accepts all genuine brands, e.g. Brother, Canon, etc. Paper Plus gives a \$2 rebate for used Brother, HP and Canon cartridges when you buy a new one.						
•	Rags (clean)	Check with your auto mechanic, painter, etc. They can often use them.

Feilding Scrap Metal, 1a Mihinui Street accepts anything made of metal. Keep a box handy

to save metal items and take it down when full. This can include metal lids, pots and pans, computers, old barbeques, plumbing bits etc. Depending on the scrap value of the items,

•	Sports Equipment	These can be dropped off in a bin at TRC Toyota, Aorangi Street who sends them to Replay who donates them to community groups.
•	Stamps - used	Send them to Hearing Dogs NZ, PO Box 8117, New Plymouth 4342 to assist them with their work.
•	Tyres - used	Bridgestone, Kimbolton Road will take them for a fee (\$5-8) depending on size. They will also provide old tyres for projects. Awapuni Resource Recovery Park in Palmerston North will also take them for a fee (\$7-12).
•	Whiteware	WJ Scrap Removal will pick up anything steel from toys to clothes lines to office furniture as well as whiteware. They also collect truck, car and bike batteries They charge a flat rate of \$10 for Feilding pick-ups. Leave a Message at 022-519-7101.
		Note: The transfer station will also take many of these items, but there will be a charge.

Items you can't yet be recycled in Feilding but can be taken to the Ferguson Street Recycling Centre, Palmerston North

• Old children's car seats There is a \$5 charge for these.

Tetra-Pak cartons
 To recycle, cut along the top and sides, open-up, flatten, rinse and dry.

• *Used cooking/motor oil.* Take the oil in a sealed container.

Items that can't be recycled

These may be of use to others. Offer them to friends or advertise on local bulletin boards or internet sites.

- Bubble wrap
- Old carpet and underlay
- Plastic medical bottles and packaging
- Soft plastics A plastic is soft if it scrunches into a ball, if it holds its shape, it's hard plastic.
- Styrofoam, Polystyrene
